FOUNDER'S MESSAGE

The year 2023-24 has been another fruitful year and we are grateful! Grateful to all our well-wishers; our donors who reposed their faith in Books For All (BFA), our volunteers who donated precious time to do good work, our staff who always put their best foot forward and corporates and individuals who have helped to make BFA what it is today.

It is BFA's 14th year and I am proud to say that we have grown steadily and organically from one library to Six Impact Missions, each promoting literacy and self-sufficiency.



The new impact mission, Sparsh, for Visually Impaired students was started this year, triggered by a remark from a well-wisher that Books For All should also provide books for blind students. During a short time of six months, BFA sent Braille story books sets, each containing 20 books, to 86 schools/institutions for visually impaired students across India.

Wall Hung Libraries (WHL), another of our Impact Missions, achieved a new milestone this year with 250 WHL being sent to schools in urban and rural villages in 20 states of India, including Andaman & Nicobar, Jammu & Kashmir, Nagaland, Manipur, Himachal Pradesh, Assam and West Bengal. Books in Bengali language were also introduced.

Thanks to two new corporate partners, BFA was able to admit 90 students to various vocational training programs, giving them the gift of skill and self-sufficiency.

Books For All was privileged to be invited to several volunteer engagements at Adobe, Noida. During the Create Change Symposium, on 21st November 2023, Mr Kailash Satyarthi, who was the Chief Guest at the event, commended BFA's impact on promoting learning, particularly through the Wall Hung Library (WHL) project in remote rural areas. Interactions such as these reaffirm our belief in the good work that we are doing and encourage us to do better and spread our wings further.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR





Celebrating 14 Years of Empowering Lives

BFA commemorated its 14th Anniversary this year, reflecting on its growth since opening its first Library cum Creativity Centre in Gheja village in 2010. BFA's six core missions cater to underprivileged children, youth, and women, primarily in Delhi-NCR's urban villages. The organization gives underprivileged children the joy of books, educational sponsorships, career counselling, vocational training, and conducts adult literacy programs.



Nobel Laureate Kailash Satyarthi praises WHL

BFA's efforts to spread Wall Hung Libraries to rural schools across the country were validated in November 2023 when we were invited by Adobe to participate in the Create Change Symposium alongside India's leading NGOs. During a visit to BFA's stall, Mr Satyarthi was particularly impressed by the WHL initiative and its impact on promoting learning in remote rural areas. He pledged his support to spread awareness of the program and to ensure that deserving schools can benefit from this impactful initiative.



Launch of New Project-SPARSH

BFA launched "Sparsh" to address the gap in accessible reading materials for visually impaired students. Sparsh is initially providing Braille storybooks to schools and institutions for the blind across India, with plans to expand to other assistive technologies. BFA seeks collaboration to identify institutions in need of Braille Books, anywhere in India.





Engaging Earth Day Activities



On 22nd April 2023, BFA celebrated Earth Day across its libraries with activities like painting, slogan writing and discussions to highlight the importance of environmental responsibility. Students staged a street play promoting waste segregation, and BFA took a group of students on a visit to the Biodiversity Park to see and learn about its diverse flora. Students took upon themselves to clean the park and rid it of debris giving a message of keeping our green spaces clean and beautiful.

Along with Teacher's Day, Hindi Diwas and Janmashtami, one of the highlights of celebration in our libraries was the success of Chandrayaan-3 mission. BFA libraries buzzed with activities as students learned about the mission and their eyes filled with pride. Our librarians used creative methods like skits, quizzes, and storytelling to tell students about the Chandrayaan -3 mission, its history and the people involved. Children made unique models and art which were displayed at the libraries.

Promoting Sustainability

Through Book Exchange/Donation Drive



BFA believes in sustainability, and in alignment with this core value, it organized a successful Book Exchange/Donation Drive. The event aimed to collect used curriculum and reference books for while sponsored students encouraging reuse and recycling among the residents of Eldeco Utopia. Over 60 families participated, donating books and exchanging stationery items. The initiative benefited underprivileged children and generated funds for purchasing new registers.

BFA organized a unique Geography quiz for students at Sarvodaya Vidya Mandir (SVM) and Green Valley Model School (GVMS). The twist? Students used only atlases, not textbooks, to answer questions, fostering a deeper understanding of geography through exploration.

BFA libraries commemorated India's Independence Day with student performances showcasing their artistic talents in dance, drama, and art & craft. This celebration instilled pride and national identity in the students. Our Librarians took this opportunity to tell students about India's freedom struggles and its great leaders.

On 13th October 2023, as many as 30 students had the privilege of experiencing the corporate world at Optum. Optum had invited BFA to be part of their Annual Corporate Volunteer Program, and the theme for the year was Bollywood. The half-day program was filled with fun and entertainment but most importantly, children from our libraries, who could otherwise never enter the corporate world, got this unique opportunity.

Fostering Learning and Creativity

BFA Libraries continued to be vibrant hubs of learning and activity throughout the year. From thematic celebrations to creative workshops, BFA librarians provided students with engaging experiences that go beyond traditional book reading.



Engaging Activities

Book Reading, Storytelling, Public speaking, Art and Craft were some of the regular activities conducted at the library for all grades. Topics such as Health and Hygiene, Best out of Waste and Extempore were taken up and activities were conducted every month. Students also participated in Story Writing, Recitation, Origami, Painting and Poem Writing in the BFA run libraries. Students took part in Debates, Show and Tell, Science Experiments, Memory games and other interactive methods of learning.



Important days and festivals are celebrated in the library so that children are aware of their significance. Librarians used creative methods like skits, quizzes, and storytelling to tell students about Earth Day, water conservation, Chandrayaan-3 mission, Independence Day etc.

Students took part in art, craft, music, and dance activities, further enriching their learning experience. Suvanshi, a State level chess player, devoted her precious time to teach chess to students of NEMP School, Noida and students of Bal Bharti organised an Origami workshop.



Digital Literacy and Skill Development

BFA partnered with IMT Ghaziabad to host 32 students who volunteered their time to support BFA's initiatives. They introduced BFA students to new concepts like Model United Nations (MUN) and conducted life skills and digital literacy sessions for students, broadening horizons their and sparking curiosity.

Additionally, BFA's collaboration with ST Foundation's Tablet 4 Kids (T4K) Project brought digital learning tools to more students in government schools.

Transforming Lives Through Student Sponsorship



BFA's signature program, Saarthak, empowers underprivileged children by providing them with access to quality education and mentorship opportunities. Since 2014, BFA has sponsored 46 deserving students, helping them gain admission to good Hindi and English medium schools.

BFA's dedication extends beyond financial aid. Committed volunteers monitor students' academic performance, provide coaching, and help them develop into well-rounded individuals. The program's success is evident in the achievements of its students. This year, 16 students from Classes 1 to 9 excelled in their final exams, with several achieving top scores in their classes.


Empowering Youth Through Vocational Training

Books For All is committed to empowering underprivileged youth by equipping them with jobready skills. This year, BFA's vocational training program achieved significant milestones.



Training and Placement

BFA admitted 90 students to diverse vocational programs such as Paramedical studies, Graphic Design and Motion Graphics, Cosmetology, Motor Technician etc. Impressively, 40 students secured positions in hospitals, clinics, and workshops upon completing their training. A paramedical graduate landed a starting salary of Rs 17,000, while a cosmetology graduate now earns Rs 22,500 monthly. These and other success stories highlight the program's effectiveness in transforming lives.

Expanding Partnerships and Course Offerings

BFA has established strong partnerships with organizations like HCL Foundation. supported the Saksham mission from 2020-2023, Salasar Techno Engineering Ltd, and Ultragenic Research and Technologies which supported the program in 2023-24. These collaborations have enabled BFA to counsel over 5,000 students in the last four years, guide them towards vocational training opportunities and support financially challenged students with admissions. BFA has also expanded its course offerings from 8 to 33, catering to a wider range of student interests and industry demands.





Career Counselling & Outreach

BFA actively reaches out to students through career counselling sessions at schools and colleges. This year, BFA counselled over 800 students and conducted three career melas in various Noida colleges. These initiatives equip students with the knowledge and guidance necessary to make informed career choices after 12th grade.

Started by a group of volunteers from Noida in 2009, BFA began counselling underprivileged students at low-income private schools and government high schools in 2021.
A large section of Class 12 students in urban village schools and government inter colleges are ignorant about career options and employment opportunities after school. They are also unaware of the educational qualifications, entrance examinations and skill sets required for pursuing different courses. We have been filling this gap by counselling underprivileged students in choosing different career options and good job in a short time," said Pravin Bhasin, founder of the BFA, and a resident of Eideco Utopia society in Sector 93A. In the past three years, the volunteers of Books For All have counselled more than 5,000 students of powers of Books For All have counselled more than 5,000 students of logovernment and pri-

counselled more than 5,000 stu-dents of 16 government and pri-vate inter colleges and high schools in Noida regarding career options and encouraged them to take up vocational courses.

"Of all the students coun selled by us, we have so far helped 350 disadvantaged stu neiped 300 disadvantaged stu-dents by helping them secur-admissions to vocational train-ing institutes and paying their fee in full. Further, we helped 160 students, who had com-pleted their courses, secure job-with good monthly salary. Foster a Love of Reading in Rural Schools

BFA's signature program, Wall Hung Libraries (WHL), is making a significant impact on children in under-resourced schools. Launched in 2021, WHL provides schools with a compact and easy-to-install library containing about 100 beautifully illustrated storybooks in English, Hindi, and regional languages. The objective is to help village schools, that have no dedicated room to spare, with a WHL that will bring joy, develop curiosity and accelerate learning among students.

By the end of 2023, BFA had installed over 375 WHLs in schools across 24 states, bringing the joy of reading to over 15,000 students. Last year alone more than 250 WHLs were sent to village schools in States all over the country, including Jammu and Kashmir, Nagaland, Manipur, Assam, Himachal Pradesh and Andaman and Nicobar Islands. BFA is committed to further expansion, with an ambitious target of reaching 400 schools in 2024-25, both in urban and rural areas.



The WHL program demonstrates the power of a simple idea to create lasting change. Each WHL costs just Rs 10,000 and requires minimal setup, making it an ideal solution for space-constrained schools.

BFA's dedication to fostering literacy has garnered recognition from prominent media outlets like ABP News and Hindustan Times. This national coverage has fueled program growth, enabling BFA to expand its reach to 24 States/UTs and cater to the diverse needs of students by offering books in Marathi, Telugu, Kannada, Bengali, Odia, Assamese as well.

'Hanging libraries' give govt schools children a chance learn and dream beyond the textbooks

NOIDA: For 13-year-old Sikander, the best part about going to school is getting to rifle through the books of his library, so that he can peep into the worlds brought alive through words and ose himself in the adventures of other children, just like him.

But Sikander's library is no grand old building with wall ifter wall lined with polished shelves, heaving under the weight of countless books and tomes. For Sikander, it is just a classroom at his government school where over a 100 story-books have been wall-mounted into a foldable bag.

It is what everyone calls a "hanging library".

A group of residents from

Noida's Sector 93A volunteering for a local NGO have placed these hanging libraries at six government schools in Noida educate children beyond their curriculum through storybooks. The initiative was started in 2021 by the NGO Books For All (BFA), to address the challenge of lack of space and infrastructure at most schools situated in urban

and rural villages.
"These students come from families with limited means, and may not have the privilege to read for leisure. The children in these schools have no access to good quality books other than their course books. That has an adverse impact on their learning outcomes. Hanging libraries addresses this shortcoming. The colourfully illustrated books attract students to read and aid learning and understanding and encourage them to write, draw and dream. The idea is to give children access to books which are not part of curriculum," said Pravin Bhasin, a resident of Eldeco Utopia society in Sector 93A.

Bhasin began BFA in 2009 by

Gejha village in Sector 93. In 2021, BFA launched its novel project, 'hanging libraries', as there was no need to invest on racks and shelves. The concept began in Noida, with these

Gejha. Each library has over 100 books on engaging themes, written in the simple language of the region and containing colourful pictures. Bilingual books are also made available as per the need. These books encourage students of all strata to develop a reading habit and increase their vocabulary, knowledge and understanding of the world in which they live and instil values in them as well," said Lata Aggarwal, another volunteer at the NGO and a resident of Eldeco Utopia

With an aim to install over 100 hanging libraries across the country, BFA began a campaign in March 2021 to gather donors for funding these libraries. "Each library of over 100 books costs about ₹8,000 and we crowd sourced funds through online campaigns. We have now installed 166 libraries in as many

August 2023," said Bhasin.

Sikander, who studies at the Government Primary & Junior School and is a resident of Sultanpur village in Sector 128 Noida, says he wants to be writer

when he grows up. "Since last year, after we were introduced to these libraries, I started writing fiction in Hindi inspired by the stories I read. I also write poetry and want to publish my own book some day just like the ones we read now, said the class 8 student, whos favourite subject is Hindi.

Aishwarya Laxmi, basic shik sha adhikari (BSA) of Gautam Budh Nagar, said, "The education department appreciates the work being done by the volunteers of Books For All as it helps in the holistic development of students at government schools The concept of hanging libraries is not only innovative, but also useful for our students without

Empowering women

BFA's "Sankalp" Adult Literacy Program is an example of our commitment to women's empowerment. Launched in November 2021, Sankalp provides free Hindi and English literacy classes to women in Gejha and Sadarpur Village.

Dedicated volunteers play a vital role by conducting workshops on essential skills like basic banking. This equips women with the confidence to manage their finances independently.

All participants in a recent program successfully completed their exams, demonstrating the program's effectiveness. BFA is proud to celebrate their achievements and is committed to empowering even more women.



Identifying the Need and Expanding the Program

The high illiteracy rate among women in the community became clear during visits to BFA libraries. Many mothers were unable to help their children with schoolwork or even manage their day-to-day activities. This prompted a survey in nearby areas, revealing that over 120 women desired to learn. This overwhelming response led to the creation of Sankalp.

IMT Ghaziabad Students Bolster BFA's Initiatives

BFA's collaboration with IMT Ghaziabad students is fostering a spirit of social responsibility. Five groups of eight students each interned with BFA on various projects, including climate change, computer literacy, and adult literacy expansion.

IMT Ghaziabad students also assisted BFA with with a survey in Sadarpur Village of Noida to assess the need for a second Sankalp center. The results, highlighting an 80% illiteracy rate, underscore the urgency of BFA's mission to empower women in the community.





SPARSH

Expanding Literacy Access for Blind Students

Books for All is proud to present the SPARSH initiative, a program dedicated to providing Braille story books and tactile books to blind and visually impaired students across India. Launched in October 2023, SPARSH follows the success of BFA's Wall Hung Libraries project, which brings the joy of reading to children in underresourced schools.



Addressing the Gap in Literacy Materials

While blind children receive textbooks as part of their curriculum, they often lack access to storybooks and general awareness materials. This absence of engaging reading materials can hinder their overall development and prevent them from experiencing the joy of reading. SPARSH aims to bridge this gap by providing Braille book sets containing a mix of stories and general knowledge topics.

Reaching Students and Institutions

Through careful research and outreach, BFA identifies institutions for Visually Impaired with the greatest need and the most enthusiastic staff. Upon receiving a request, BFA ships a set of 20 Braille story books to the institution and follows up to ensure receipt. BFA remains engaged, gathering feedback and usage data through calls, messages, pictures, and videos.

Impact and Looking Ahead

In the short time since its launch, SPARSH has reached to over 6,000 visually impaired students in 85 institutions. BFA's goal for the upcoming year is to reach at least 150 schools, providing Braille books to an additional 8,000 students. Regular reporting will track the project's progress, including a list of recipient institutions, feedback received, and plans for future expansion. An annual assessment report will comprehensively evaluate SPARSH's impact on student development and reading habits.

When Sankalp, the Adult Literacy Centre, was initiated in Gejha village, we were eager to witness the transformation it would bring. Her hard work, combined with the dedication and energy of our volunteer, Ms. Heena (right), who was committed to seeing positive changes in Kamlesh, made this success possible.

From a young age, Sumit Kumar Singh was deeply interested in technical courses. After learning about BFA, he received counseling and decided to pursue courses in Automobile Repair and General Technician from Automobile Repair and Service Institute run by Uttam Toyota.



Anjali - Dream Comes True

Anjali's journey has been one of resilience and determination. She started her education at DAV School, but financial difficulties forced her to transfer to a government school. Despite these challenges, Anjali never gave up on her dreams. She learned about BFA through a friend and decided to reach out for help. BFA counselled her to join a Motion Graphics course at MAAC Institute. While continuing her course, Anjali joined Jindal X Meesho's chatbot department. She is now in the HR department at Vedify Solutions Pvt Ltd, earning Rs 17000. In addition, she has ventured into freelancing, taking on video editing projects that bring in an impressive Rs 30000 to 35000.



Rupa - She could buy a Piece of Property

Rupa's father, was a daily wage laborer, couldn't support her education beyond the 9th grade. Aware that without education she might face the same struggles as her parents, Rupa sought help. BFA, recognizing her potential, sponsored her education from the 9th through the 12th grade and enrolled her in a Diploma in Emergency Medical Technology at UNIZONA (2020-2022). After graduating, she started her career at a hospital in Chandigarh with a salary of Rs. 17,000/-. Now, she works at Artemis in Gurgaon, earning Rs. 20,000/-while pursuing a Diploma in Physiotherapy to advance her career. Significantly, Rupa has also purchased property in her hometown, Bardhaman, West Bengal. Her parents are proud and are grateful to Books For All.



Pooja - Her Family's Safety Net

After completing her 12th grade, Pooja approached BFA in order to enroll in a Data Entry Operator course to improve her family's financial situation. Her mother was the sole breadwinner as her father was unwell. This placed a heavy financial burden on the family. Pooja, after completing the course, joined Steller IT Park in Sector 62, earning a salary of Rs 16500. Her perseverance and dedication led her to a better position at India Mart, where her salary increased to Rs 18000. Pooja is deeply grateful to BFA for the support that allowed her to help her family financially and become self-reliant.
